James 5:1-3 (NLT)

Look here, you rich people: Weep and groan with anguish because of all the terrible troubles ahead of you. Your wealth is rotting away, and your fine clothes are moth-eaten rags. Your gold and silver are corroded. The very wealth you were counting on will eat away your flesh like fire. This corroded treasure you have hoarded will testify against you on the day of judgment.

Wisdom looks to the future, <u>especially</u> in times of crisis.

God's principles to pull me out of crisis:



God opposes greed, not wealth.

1 Timothy 6:10 (CEV)

The love of money causes all kinds of trouble. Some people want money so much that they have given up their faith and caused themselves a lot of pain.



Ecclesiastes 5:10-12 (CEV)

If you love money and wealth, you will never be satisfied with what you have. This doesn't make sense either. The more you have, the more everyone expects from you. Your money won't do you any good— others will just spend it for you. If you have to work hard for a living, you can rest well at night, even if you don't have much to eat. But if you are rich, you can't even sleep.



God gives us money to save and give, not to stockpile.
